

#### **Child Sexual Abuse Online - Tracking Down Perpetrators**

88 million images of child abuse circulated worldwide in the year 2022. Two images of child rape are shared online every second. Social networks make it especially easy for sex offenders to prey on victims.

Back in 2009, the United Nations estimated that 750,000 pedophiles were online at any one time. Fifteen years later, experts believe that figure has tripled. Believing themselves to be shielded by the apparent anonymity of chatrooms, these men - most of the perpetrators are men - exchange ideas on how best to approach and manipulate a child into supplying explicit material.

They also give each other tips on how to rape a child known to them and share images with others without being caught. Some enquire about commissioning the rape of a child to their exact specifications on the other side of the world - and to witness this live via Skype or WhatsApp for less than a hundred dollars.

A nightmare that is part of everyday life for child protection organizations and law enforcement agencies, who are faced with the challenge of identifying victims of abuse, tracking down the perpetrators and preventing the proliferation of pedocriminal content.

For four years, director Laetitia Ohnona observed the day-to-day work of relevant agencies in Germany, France, Britain, North America and the Philippines: accompanying French police from the new central office for the protection of minors, undercover American special agents from the Homeland Security Investigations agency, the Public Prosecutor General's Office in Frankfurt and German police officers responsible for taking down darknet pages, as well as employees of reporting platforms tracking down pedocriminal content. On a visit to the European Commission, she learned that it plans to impose stricter rules on IT companies.

#### A Place to Feel Safe - New Approaches in Dementia Care

What kind of environment is the right one for people with dementia? The film explores new ways to provide more appropriate care to sufferers of this disease.

Dementia is a disease that not only torments those affected, but also often puts relationships with loved ones under severe strain. 1.8 million people in Germany suffer from dementia. It's estimated that by 2050, that figure could rise to more than 2.8 million. The question of appropriate and, above all, humane care is becoming increasingly urgent. Most dementia sufferers are accommodated in care homes. However, this is often not the best concept, due to a shortage of skilled nursing staff and other factors. What is needed are places where people can feel safe and secure.

In this report, we meet people with first-hand experience of dementia - like Julia Bernsee, whose mother was diagnosed with the disease in 2019. Her mother was able to stay at home initially, but then Julia took her into her own home. When her mother spent some time in a nursing home, Julia was alarmed at the realities of care in such places. This is because dementia patients are often sedated with medication. But then Julia found a new facility.

## **Legendary Giants - Kapok Trees in the Amazon Rainforest**

The majestic kapok tree in the Amazon rainforest forms a gigantic habitat. Its canopy of leaves, almost 50 meters high, towers over the crowns of the forest. The tree shapes the myths of the indigenous Wayana people. With over 80,000 plant species and hundreds of thousands of animal species, the Amazon rainforest is a green ocean of life. In the midst of this ecosystem, the kapok tree provides both shelter and crucial spaces for reproduction. Numerous animal species could not survive without the kapok tree. Dragonflies and damselflies buzz around the spines on its trunk to lay their larvae in the bromeliad 'air plants' that grow on the tree. Here, the smallest influences the largest - and vice versa. Bromeliad plants do double duty, acting as floating water reservoirs: they store up to 50,000 liters of water per hectare of forest.

When the forest floor is under water during the rainy season, the fish become gardeners. They feed on the seeds that have fallen from the trees and spread them all over the Amazon region. The kapok tree is firmly anchored in the ground with its huge roots until the next dry season. The whole forest breathes, from the moss on the ground to the treetops. This gas exchange makes life on earth possible. But dangers such as deforestation and climate change threaten this unique ecosystem.

## Collecting, Storing and Preserving

How can we preserve our current flood of knowledge, data and objects for future generations? What is important, and what can go? The better storage options become, the more difficult it is to answer this question. We humans like to preserve everything, whether we've collected or created it. Be it sourdough starters, books or blood samples. We want to preserve objects, memories and even microorganisms.

Karl de Smedt is the only sourdough librarian in the world. In St. Vith, Belgium, he keeps 144 sourdough starters from all over the globe, some of which are over 100 years old. Through his collection, he preserves the unique wild yeasts and microorganisms that create each sourdough.

The German National Library in Leipzig and Frankfurt preserves copies of all books, records and media published in or about Germany since 1913. There are 34 million physical media on the shelves. Digitization can solve the space problem, but also has its pitfalls. For example: data has to be constantly copied, as hard disks can become unusable.

Prof. Robert Grass from ETH Zurich is developing a particularly promising storage medium: DNA storage. It is extremely powerful, can be stored for over 1,000 years and can always be read. Data is converted into the DNA code and stored as artificial DNA.

BioBank Dresden stores tumor samples, blood, urine and cerebrospinal fluid for research purposes. Evidence from criminal offenses is stored in the evidence room of the public prosecutor's office in Frankfurt am Main. This allows crimes to be re-analyzed using modern techniques and solved decades later.

## Reversing Extinction - The Next Chapter in Conservation?

All around the world, scientists are working to recreate lost animal species such as the mammoth. Using modern genetic techniques, they're extracting ancient genetic material from museum exhibits. Do their efforts represent hope for the future of the natural world? Or is science playing God? Findings in the thawed permafrost of Siberia have made it possible to reconstruct the DNA of mammoths. Researchers are now experimenting with inserting genes related to the ability to resist cold temperatures into the Asian elephant, which is related to the mammoth. The animals thus created could survive in the steppes of Siberia and Alaska.

In Australia, scientists have managed to extract the genetic material of marsupial wolves from preserved embryos in museums. The predator's genes are replicated in the lab and implanted into the related marsupial mouse - in a bid to bring the extinct creature back to life.

And biotechnology could also help white rhinos in Africa: Researchers in Berlin are fertilizing eggs from the last two living females with sperm from deceased males frozen and preserved for decades.

However, these practices are also attracting criticism. Biology researchers question the usefulness of revived species for natural habitats. They fear that the excitement surrounding the idea of bringing back extinct species could distract people from the many problems that cause animals to disappear, in the first place. Are some scientists playing God - with unforeseeable consequences for the environment?

## A Forgotten Heroine - How Emilie Schindler Saved Jewish Lives

Emilie Schindler. A heroine, forgotten by history, who fearlessly saved Jewish lives. The name of her husband Oskar Schindler became synonymous with acts of compassion and humanity in the Nazi era. But what role did his wife Emilie Schindler play?

Filmmaker Annette Baumeister tells the story of Emilie Schindler, who protected people without attracting much attention. After the war, Emilie was abandoned by her husband and forgotten by the world.

Emilie Pelzl was born in the Sudetenland in 1907. From an early age, she worked on her parents' farm and cared for relatives. At the age of 20, she fell in love with the charming Oskar Schindler. Although he was considered a heartbreaker, she married him. Oskar had affairs and squandered the dowry, but Emilie stuck by him. During World War Two, the Schindlers ran factories and employed Jewish workers - saving many of them from the death camps.

In this documentary, Emilie Schindler's Argentinian carer Leandro Coseforti, her niece Traude Ferrari, and historians all describe a forgotten heroine. Annette Baumeister sensitively reconstructs Emilie Schindler's life, bringing her out of her husband's shadow.

The film draws a picture of a woman who risked her life to help others. By procuring food and medicine for those in need, she helped to rescue many Jewish people right under the noses of the SS.

#### Jerusalem - The Ongoing Fight Over the Holy City

Now, more than over, Jerusalem finds itself in the eye of the storm that is the Middle East conflict. The most populous city in Israel is a holy place for Christians, Jews and Muslims. And claims to its historic sites are the subject of furious dispute between Israelis and Palestinians.

The documentary sheds light on the political and religious background to the conflict over Jerusalem and places the current events in their historical context. Those involved have their say and experts comment on the current situation. Hamas named its 7 October terrorist attack on Israel 'Operation Al-Aqsa Flood' in reference to the famous Al-Aqsa Mosque on the Temple Mount in Jerusalem.

In doing so, the Islamists are once again focusing global attention on the Holy City. Both sides lay claim to the Temple Mount, a place of religious significance for both communities. This is why Jerusalem has always been at the center of the Israeli-Palestinian confrontation. Middle East experts agree on one point: without a solution for Jerusalem, which both Israelis and Palestinians claim as the capital of their state, or possible future state, this conflict will not be resolved.

The documentary, which was made after 7 October, investigates one of the most profound conflicts of our time. It explores invisible borders, sheds light on the failed UN partition plan and tells of the eternal battle for the holy sites on Temple Mount. The film depicts a city where people co-exist without hatred, where a modern 'start-up nation' rubs shoulders with ancient culture - and where hope has not yet been completely extinguished.

#### **Prosperity Without Growth - Is it Possible?**

Critics of growth want to bring the economy into harmony with the environment and social well-being. They see a world that functions without constantly wanting more. But is that realistic?

Hamburg chefs Marianus von Hörsten and Aaron Levi Hasenpusch have decided to turn their back on the idea that a business should always be growing. Their restaurant is closed on weekends. It means more free time and less stress, but also less turnover and less income. For them, it's feasible.

Otto Fuchs produces specialized metal components for the automotive and aviation industries. His company is aiming for "green growth" — to grow while operating in a climate-friendly way. But this is no easy task. In Germany, climate protection and the transition to green energy cost a lot of money.

Ulrike Herrmann, author of Das Ende des Kapitalismus (The End of Capitalism) is skeptical about green growth. She says it's not possible, and advocates instead for "degrowth" in order to save the planet. Restructuring the economy would consume vast amounts of clean energy, and Germany simply couldn't install that many wind turbines. In other words, we'll have to rein ourselves in.

After the 2008 financial crisis, Iceland introduced a new economic evaluation: the "Wellbeing Economy". As well as measuring things that have a price tag, it also takes into account welfare and quality of life, including access to housing and green spaces, as well as gender equality. Negative factors like environmental degradation and the consumption of resources are also included. Kristín Vala Ragnarsdóttir is professor of sustainability science at the University of Iceland. She's committed to the idea of a sustainable economy.

## Saving Our Soil - Farming with a Future

For a long time, soil was all but ignored. But for years, the valuable humus layer has been thinning. Farmers in Brandenburg are clearly feeling the effects of this on their sandy fields. Many are now taking steps to prepare their farms for the future.

Years of drought, record rainfall and failed harvests: we are becoming increasingly aware of how sensitively our environment reacts to extreme weather conditions. Farmers' livelihoods are at stake. So is the ability of consumers to afford food.

For a few years now, agriculture that focuses solely on maximum yields has been regarded with increasing skepticism. It is becoming more and more clear just how dependent we are on healthy soils.

Brandenburg is the federal state with the worst soil quality in Germany. The already thin, fertile humus layer has been shrinking for decades. Researchers and farmers who are keen to experiment are combating these developments and looking for solutions. Priority is being given to building up the humus layer, which consists of microorganisms and fungi, as well as springtails, small worms and centipedes.

For Lena and Philipp Adler, two young vegetable farmers, the tiny soil creatures are invaluable helpers. On their three-hectare organic farm, they rely on simple, mechanical weed control, fallow areas where the soil can recover, and diversity. Conventional farmer Mark Dümichen also does everything he can to protect soil life on his land. For years, he has not tilled the soil after the harvest and sows directly into the field. His yields have stabilized since he began to work this way.

Isabella Krause from Regionalwert AG Berlin-Brandenburg is convinced after the experiences of the last hot summers that new crops will thrive on Brandenburg's fields in the long term. She has founded a network of farmers who are promoting the cultivation of chickpeas with support from the scientific community.

## The Nile Dam - A Dangerous Power Game

Is a war over water looming in North Africa? The Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam on the Nile in Ethiopia could change the balance of power in north-east Africa. Sudan and Egypt, both dependent on the Nile, are alarmed.

Water is a contested resource. Many African states are building large dams with power plants to secure their energy independence and promote agriculture - with Ethiopia at the forefront. The construction of the Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam - the largest dam in Africa - has been a source of tension between Ethiopia, Egypt and Sudan for more than a decade. The Nile supplies more than 300 million people with water. It has always been at the center of conflicts of interest. The new dam, which is located a few kilometers from the Sudanese border, will be a determining factor in the geopolitics in the region. Intended to strengthen the Ethiopian economy and enable the state to become a regional energy power, it is of great importance to Ethiopia. Construction is now almost complete and the country is already selling the energy it generates to neighboring countries. Egyptian President Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi refers to his country's "historical right" to the Nile and warns of unprecedented instability in the region. Egypt, which sees the dam as a threat to national security, is doing everything it can to delay its construction, while putting pressure on the international community at the United Nations. Sudan, which is currently in the midst of a bloody civil war, has an interest in maintaining a dialog with its neighbors. The Horn of Africa is rich in natural resources and water. New players such as the United

## **Saving Beavers and Pond Turtles**

The European pond turtle is to be reintroduced to the Upper Rhine. Biologists Kathrin Theissinger and Jean-Yves Georges have been fighting for this. Their goal is to reintroduce the species and restore its natural habitats. Wetlands are among the most diverse and most endangered ecosystems on earth. They store large amounts of carbon and therefore play an important role in adapting to climate change. They also mitigate flooding. However, they are not very suitable for agriculture and a reputation for musty odors and mosquitoes means that wetlands have something of an image problem. Yet these areas are a biotope for many endangered species. Kathrin Theissinger and Jean-Yves Georges are campaigning for the reintroduction of the European pond turtle. They are convinced that this species, which is important for ecological balance, is a popular figure and can act as an "ambassador for wetlands".

The natural creator of wetlands, the beaver, also has an image problem. It was extinct in Europe until the last century. One of the first regions in which it was reintroduced was Bavaria. Since then, beavers have proliferated here - and continue to cause trouble. When wildlife biologist Gerhard Schwab returned from his studies in the USA in the 1980s, he was commissioned by the government to take care of 'problem' beavers.

He always tries to find pragmatic solutions. He prefers to release captured beavers into the wild in other countries, such as England. But it isn't always possible to get rid of the animals this way.

Many projects are committed to rewilding. But are they sustainable? The need for beaver management shows: Species conservation is a task for society as a whole and needs to be tackled with long-term vision.

## The Stone Age Diet - Part 2: When Homo Sapiens Became Farmers

Our human ancestors fundamentally changed their eating behavior in the Neolithic period. This was when they began to cultivate cereals and domesticate wild animals. This change happened quickly and had a decisive impact on the evolutionary history of mankind.

Around 10,000 years ago, Neolithic man fundamentally changed his eating behavior with the switch to agriculture and animal husbandry. Prior to this, species such as Australopithecus, Homo erectus, Neanderthals and Homo sapiens lived for around 2.5 million years from hunting and gathering - from what nature provided. This Paleolithic period had a decisive influence on their evolution

But within just a few thousand years, Homo sapiens secured a new food base by cultivating cereals and domesticating wild animals. This abrupt change had a profound impact on the anatomical, genetic and cognitive development of humans. Archaeological finds and new scientific methods over the past 15 years have provided new insights, revealing just how much Neolithic cuisine also impacted human evolution.

Why did man's ancestors abandon nomadic life and turn to agriculture? What did their new diet consist of? Why was this change initially harmful to humans? How did the human body adapt to agricultural products and overcome the limits of evolution in the process? How did knowledge of food preparation and preservation help them? And how have these changes shaped modern society?

In the second part of the documentary, researchers from various disciplines present the latest and most important findings on this topic.

## Secret Underworlds of the Soviet Union: Georgia

Bunkers, tunnels, former torture chambers: Georgia is home to secret underworlds, built during the Soviet era. Hardly any other country in the world has as many underground structures as tiny Georgia. What lies dormant just a few meters underground is being brought to light for the first time. During the Cold War, Georgia was part of the Soviet Union. And it had a NATO country as a neighbor: Turkey. During Russian rule, bunkers were built to provide protection in the event of a nuclear war, secret dungeons were built for political prisoners and mysterious tunnels appeared as well.

Tornike Kapanadze has been researching the country's bunkers since 2016. He takes visitors inside the country's largest command bunker: 135 rooms and two kilometers of tunnels. Ana Sepashvili is actually an archaeologist, but also researches the secret prisons of the Stalin era. Traces left behind by prisoners from this era can still be found, today. Zhana Odiashvili discovers one of Stalin's secret hiding places in an inconspicuous house. A well leads to an underground print shop. In 1907, Stalin helped plan one of the greatest crimes of the time, here - the robbery of the state bank in the Georgian capital city.

## Haiti - The Iron Grip of the Gangs

In Port-au-Prince, nearly three million people are living in the grips of all-out gang war. A film crew spent a fortnight filming in and around the Haitian capital and documented how regular people are suffering under this brutal gang rule.

Gangs now control more than 80% of the city. One of the most notorious gang leaders in the Haitian capital is Jimmy Chérizier, also known as "Barbecue". He says the gangs won't be laying down their arms any time soon. "We demand to be at the negotiating table," he said, speaking from his stronghold in the slums of Port-au-Prince. "If not, we will continue to fight." Barbecue is the frontman of a powerful alliance of various gangs in the capital. Instead of fighting each other, the armed groups have united and turned their firepower on the state, forcing prime minister Ariel Henry to resign during an overseas trip in March 2024.

Today, the gangs wield considerable economic and military leverage. They control most of Port-au-Prince's seafront, and thus the zones surrounding the country's strategically vital ports. Haiti relies heavily on imports, shipping in more than 50% of its food, a figure that is shocking for a country with an abundance of fertile land. Many Haitians blame corrupt, ultra-wealthy elites for the situation, accusing them of building their vast family fortunes via monopolies on staple goods.

In the shantytowns of Port-au-Prince, controlled by the gangs, there are thousands of people who are unable or unwilling to flee. Murders, kidnappings, gang rapes and fires are commonplace, with no end to the crisis in sight.

While the situation in their homeland continues to worsen, their dream is within reach. The Russian army is about to invade Ukraine. In the face of this imminent threat, will these young people get to go on their adventure of a lifetime?

## In China's Shadow - The Philippines at the Heart of a Global Conflict

In the South China Sea, the US and China are fighting for dominance in the Indo-Pacific region. The Philippines finds itself caught in the middle of a struggle between two superpowers.

For decades, Beijing has been expanding its military presence in the South China Sea, a region that includes Taiwan, Indonesia and the Philippines. It has occupied atolls and reefs, turning them into military outposts - especially on Philippine territory.

But resistance to China's expansionist policies is growing. President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. of the Philippines is standing up to Beijing. He is turning away from the China-friendly policies of his predecessor and towards Western partners — especially the United States. The move has angered China, leading to increased tensions in the South China Sea. Clashes between Philippine and Chinese ships are on the rise.

The situation is highly volatile, especially because of a far-reaching defense treaty between Manila and Washington. Similar to the NATO alliance, both countries are obliged to defend each other in the event of an attack. The US has also secured access to nine Philippine military bases, allowing it to station troops and arms sometimes just a few hundred kilometers from China and Taiwan. In the event of a war between the US and China, the Philippines would find itself on the front lines.

The archipelago nation is now a line of demarcation in one of the world's most turbulent maritime regions. What's more, any further escalation would impact a vital global trade route.

## The War Against Ukraine Puts Pressure on Russian-Germans

A rift has been running through the Russian-German community since 24 February 2022. That's the day Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine began. This documentary shows how the Russian-German community's life has changed since then.

The team was already filming people from the Russian-German community in 2022. After more than two years of Russia's war against Ukraine, with its grueling fighting, thousands of deaths, dwindling support among the population and no prospect of peace, they return to film them once again. Much has changed. Take the Heuchelhof district of Würzburg in southern Germany, where many Russian-Germans live. Shortly after the war began, the "Z" symbol, a sign of the Russian army, was daubed on a church. The families were caught between a rock and a hard place. Shame and fear, tensions within the family, increased discrimination from outside and often hostility from within their own ranks weighed heavily on them. And today? Are those who fight for a positive, peaceful coexistence holding their ground? Or is divisive propaganda gaining the upper hand?

### Africa - Future Lab for the World

Ten of the world's fastest growing economies are located on the African continent. Companies in the field of science and innovation are being promoted. Climate-friendly ideas for the future are already being realized in African countries.

Africa has the youngest, fastest-growing population of any continent. This is reflected in the innovative strength emanating from many African nations: young scientists in particular are being supported and are developing creative, climate-friendly strategies that have the potential to solve global problems.

At the same time, many African countries face immense challenges: political crises, wars, population growth and climate change. Solutions are being developed on a local level. In Kenya, for example, a team of young scientists has succeeded in using new technologies to reduce the price of animal feed production. Mobile communication solutions from Nairobi deliver knowledge and education in indigenous languages to the remotest regions of East Africa. Kenya and Uganda are already supplied with more than 90 per cent renewable energy. A young Afro-German entrepreneur in Kampala is taking advantage of this - he wants to expand e-mobility in private transport. The municipal healthcare system in Accra, Ghana, is already working with artificial intelligence developed in Africa.

However, climate change caused by industrialized nations in the northern hemisphere poses a particular threat to Africa. Of the almost 1.5 billion Africans from 54 countries, as many as 117 million people could be at risk from rising sea levels in 2030.

By 2100, Africa's total population could be around 3.8 billion. One solution under consideration is to build a floating city in Lagos, Nigeria, that can adapt to the consequences of climate change.

### **The American Abortion War**

The film follows one of America's leading abortion opponents, Mark Lee Dickson, in Texas. He wants to prevent women from traveling to another state for an abortion. Dickson and his followers believe that abortion is always murder.

They do not even accept the birth control pill. They believe that life begins with the union of sperm and egg. As a result of Texas' strict abortion policy, clinics offering abortions have had to relocate to neighboring New Mexico. How do the bans affect women? And what is it like to work as a doctor who performs abortions? The film examines questions like these. But the film also shows that there is resistance to Dickson's campaigns, including a women's group that opposes the ultra-conservatives.

# A Gold Rush in Space - The Business of Space Travel

Astrophysicist Gernot Grömer wants to promote space travel. So he founded the Austrian Space Forum. Grömer sees himself as a "shipbuilder" who's working on making the journey to Mars possible in 20 to 30 years. To this end, he conducts analog missions here on Earth. For these, scientists known as analog astronauts practice for the journey to the Red Planet, collecting knowledge along the way. AMADEE-24 is the name of the current mission, which will take place in 2024 in cooperation with the Armenian Space Agency in the Ararat region, an environment with Mars-like geology.

The film accompanies the mission through its highs and lows. However, the Austrian Space Forum and its many volunteers are not only practicing for the colonization of Mars. Under the direction of Gernot Grömer, they are also working on a nanosatellite that searches for space debris. Space may be infinite, but the Earth's nearby orbits now resemble a large garbage dump.

Europe must keep a foot in the door, rather than leaving the space race up to China and the USA: That's the goal of Augsburg rocket engineer Stefan Brieschenk. He founded the Rocket Factory Augsburg in 2018. He's working hard, both here and in the far north of Sweden, on a rocket that will soon launch satellites into space from Europe -- at an unbeatable price. The Rocket Factory recycles items from other industrial sectors, including tanks from the brewing industry.

A film that sheds light on the opportunities and risks inherent to the business of space.
